This Accessibility Plan is drawn up in compliance with current legislation and requirements as specified in Schedule 10, relating to Disability, of the Equality Act 2010. The school's Executive Board and governors are accountable for ensuring the implementation, review and reporting of progress of the Accessibility Plan over a prescribed period.

The Equality Act 2010 replaced all existing equality legislation, including the Disability Discrimination Act. The effect of the law is the same as in the past, meaning that "schools cannot unlawfully discriminate against pupils because of sex, race, disability, religion or belief and sexual orientation".

According to the Equality Act 2010 a person has a disability if:

- (a) He or she has a physical or mental impairment, and
- (b) The impairment has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on his or her ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities.

The Accessibility Plan is structured to complement and support the school's Equality Objectives, and will similarly be published on the school website. We understand that the Local Authority will monitor the school's activity under the Equality Act 2010 (and in particular Schedule 10 regarding Accessibility) and will advise upon the compliance with that duty.

Objectives

ALP Nuneaton is committed to providing an environment that enables full curriculum access that values and includes all learners, staff, parents and visitors regardless of their education, physical, sensory, social, spiritual, emotional and cultural needs. We are committed to taking positive action in the spirit of the Equality Act 2010 with regard to disability and to developing a culture of inclusion, support and awareness within the school.

The school recognises and values a parent's knowledge of their child's disability and its effect on their ability to carry out everyday activities and respects the parent's and child's right to confidentiality.

ALP Nuneaton's Accessibility Plan shows how access is to be improved for disabled learners, staff and visitors to the school within a given timeframe and anticipating the need to make reasonable adjustments to accommodate their needs where practicable.

The Accessibility Plan contains relevant and timely actions to:-

- Increase access to the curriculum for learners with a physical disability and/or sensory impairments, expanding the curriculum as necessary to ensure that any future learners with a disability are as equally prepared for life as the able-bodied learners; (If a school fails to do this they are in breach of their duties under the Equalities Act 2010); this covers teaching and learning and the wider curriculum of the school such as participation in after-school clubs, leisure and cultural activities or schools visits it also covers the provision of specialist or auxiliary aids and equipment, which may assist these learners in accessing the curriculum within a reasonable timeframe;
- Improve and maintain access to the physical environment of the school, adding specialist facilities as necessary this covers
 improvements to the physical environment of the school and physical aids to access education within a reasonable
 timeframe;
- Improve the delivery of written information to learners, staff, parents and visitors with disabilities; examples might include hand-outs, timetables, textbooks, electronic communication and information about the school and school events; the information should be made available in various preferred formats within a reasonable timeframe.

This Accessibility Plan relates to the key aspects of physical environment, curriculum and written information.

Whole school training will recognise the need to continue raising awareness for staff and the Executive Board on equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010.

This Accessibility Plan should be read in conjunction with the following school policies, strategies and documents:

- Behaviour Management and Exclusions Policy
- Curriculum Policy
- Health & Safety Policy
- School Improvement Plan
- Equality and Diversity Policy

The Accessibility Plan for physical accessibility relates to the access of the School, which remains the responsibility of the Executive Board. It may not be feasible to undertake all of the works during the life of this accessibility plan and therefore some items will roll forward into subsequent plans. Accessibility will be assessed in site inspections by the school prior to the end of each period covering this plan in order to inform the development of a new Accessibility Plan for the ongoing period. It will also be assessed on a needs related basis. ALP Nuneaton specialises in changing our environment to suit the needs of individual learners, this forms part of our ethos.

The Managing Director represents the board for Health and Safety and will conduct site inspections that include consideration for the Equality Act 2010. Changes to the structure of the building or redesign of its interior will be considered in the accessibility plan.

The Accessibility Plan will be published on the school website.

The Accessibility Plan will be monitored through the Executive Board, Local Management Group and/or Health and Safety Committee.

The Accessibility Plan may be monitored by Ofsted during inspection processes in relation to Schedule 10 of the Equality Act 2010.

It is a requirement that the school's accessibility plan is resourced, implemented, reviewed and revised as necessary and reported on annually. Attached is a set of action plans showing how the school will address the priorities identified in the plan.
